WLA CODE OF CONDUCT

The Wisconsin Library Association (WLA) holds professional conferences and meetings to enable its members to receive continuing education, build professional networks, and discover new products and services for professional use. To provide all participants - members and other attendees, speakers, exhibitors, staff, and volunteers - the opportunity to and have fun. Please do so responsibly and with respect for benefit from the event, WLA is committed to providing a harassment-free environment for everyone, regardless of gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, If you believe you have been harassed or that a harassment disability, physical appearance, ethnicity, religion or other group identity.

As an association, WLA is strongly committed to diversity, equity and the free expression of ideas. Taken cumulatively, these values are based on our professional organization's (Wisconsin Library Association) firm belief in the value of civil discourse and the free exploration of competing ideas and concepts - with a fundamental respect for the rights, dignity and value of all persons.

Within the context of this WLA Code of Conduct and, more broadly, the freedom of expression, critical examination of beliefs and viewpoints does not, by itself, constitute hostile conduct or harassment. Similarly, use of sexual imagery or language in the context of a professional discussion might not constitute hostile conduct or harassment.

WLA seeks to provide a conference environment in which diverse participants may learn, network and enjoy the company of colleagues in an environment of mutual human respect. We recognize a shared responsibility to create and hold that environment for the benefit of all. Some behaviors are, therefore, specifically prohibited:

- Harassment or intimidation based on race, religion, language, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, disability, appearance, or other group status.
- Sexual harassment or intimidation, including unwelcome • sexual attention, stalking (physical or virtual), or unsolicited physical contact.
- Yelling at or threatening speakers or attendees (verbally or physically).
- Failure to comply with the Policies Governing Conference Registration, Conference Attendees, Speakers and Presenters, and Exhibitors.

Speakers are asked to frame discussions as openly and inclusively as possible and to be aware of how language or images may be perceived by others. Participants may at any time exercise the option of leaving a presentation or exhibit. Exhibitors must follow all WLA Exhibits rules, regulations, and policies as outlined in the Policies Governing Conference Registration, Conference Attendees, Speakers and Presenters; and Exhibitors as well as any event-specific requirements.

All participants are expected to observe these rules and behaviors in all conference venues, including online venues and conference social events. Participants asked to stop hostile or harassing behavior are expected to comply immediately. Conference participants seek to learn, network the right of others to do likewise.

problem exists, report the incident on WLA's website, using this link. After an online report is submitted, WLA will determine and carry out the appropriate course of action, and may engage WLA Directors, staU or legal counsel as appropriate. For more details about reporting, see WLA's Reporting Guide. Event security and/or local law enforcement may be involved, as appropriate based on the specific circumstances. A follow-up report will be made to individuals who report the harassment.

Special considerations for virtual events

The provisions of the Wisconsin Library Association Code of Conduct apply to virtual WLA events. We remind virtual event attendees to remember that threats, harassment, and intimidation are just as damaging when transmitted online as they are in person and will be not be tolerated.

Attendees are prohibited from sharing content, recordings, chat logs, comments, or screenshots from WLA virtual events on any other online platforms or in any other virtual communications. Attendees should take only the notes they need for personal use. Recording of program sessions is prohibited, except for authorized agents of WLA capturing recordings for outicial WLA use. Disruption of presentations during sessions or other conference events is not acceptable. Any attendees who attempt to take over screensharing or broadcast unrelated images or messages during a conference event shall be removed from the meeting. People found in violation of any part of the WLA Code of Conduct will face consequences including but not limited to: expulsion from the conference, prohibition from returning to any future virtual event, and will not receive a refund of their registration fees.

WLA POLICIES GOVERNING CONFERENCE REGISTRATION, CONFERENCE ATTENDEES, SPEAKERS AND PRESENTERS, AND EXHIBITORS REGISTRATION POLICIES

Registration Policies

1. All individuals in WLA conference spaces are required to have registration credentials (a registered attendee name badge). WLA staff (and in some cases venue staff) will monitor activities to ensure that all individuals in conference spaces are registered for the event/conference. These include but are not limited to keynote speaker addresses, breakout sessions, receptions, banquet functions, exhibit hall access, and tours. a. Spouses, partners, or other non-industry guests are required to register for every WLA conference function they choose to attend. These include but are not limited to keynote speaker addresses, breakout sessions, receptions, banquet functions, exhibit hall access, and tours.

 Registration is required for all attendees at virtual events, even if attendees plan to participate in a group setting.
 There will be a preferential registration fee for WLA members. A preferential registration fee may be extended to other groups with the approval of the WLA Board of Directors.

4. Unless otherwise indicated, volunteers are expected to pay the regular registration fees to attend the conference.
5. Speakers are required to register for the conference if they plan to attend other conference events in addition to their individual session. Speakers do not need to register if they will only participate in/attend their individual session.
6. Individuals registering for conferences and events must be current on payments for past events. WLA reserves the right to decline registration to individuals who have outstanding invoices for past events.

7. All conference attendees are required to review and sign the WLA Code of Conduct as part of the registration process.

Speaker/Presenter Policies

 The purpose of all keynote and breakout sessions at WLA Conferences is to provide educational content and focus.
 Honoraria for keynote speakers will be negotiated by WLA staff in consultation with the conference committee.
 WLA does not provide compensation* of any kind to breakout presenters. Breakout presenters that fall under this policy include, but are not limited to, employees and trustees of Wisconsin Libraries, library agencies or library systems; and those presenters not related to the Wisconsin library community. *Special circumstances that are individually agreed upon may apply.

4. All conference speakers and presenters are required to review and sign the WLA Code of Conduct.

Exhibit Hall Policies

1. Exhibitors must register all representatives in attendance.

2. Selling or sales presentations are limited to the tradeshow floor and only by registered exhibitors. Any individual that is not a registered exhibitor is prohibited from soliciting WLA attendees in any space at the venue during the conference.

3. Exhibitors are required to staff their booth during posted exhibit hall hours. Tear-down before the posted tear-down period is not allowed unless approved by WLA in advance.

4. No unregistered individuals will be allowed on the tradeshow floor. This includes, but is not limited to, unregistered industry or non-industry individuals, vendors, visitors, and/or guests.

Onsite Food & Beverage

 WLA staff will do their best to accommodate individuals with food allergens and other dietary restrictions.
 However, we cannot guarantee that event food offerings will meet every dietary request or requirement.
 For food safety reasons and in compliance with venue policies and/or contractual catering agreements, attendees are not permitted to carry food out from WLA conference banquet buffets or any other functions.
 Both alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages may be served at WLA socials, receptions, and other networking events. Participants at WLA events are expected to drink responsibly. WLA and venue staff have the right to deny service to attendees for any reason and may require an attendee to leave the event.

Individuals who violate any of the above policies may face expulsion from the conference function or the conference overall and will not be allowed to attend inperson WLA conferences for a period as determined by the Executive Committee of the WLA Board of Directors.

Finding and Using Historical Documents to Hear the Voices of Indigenous Nations of Wisconsin

Dr. Cornelius spent 10 years researching historical documents to find the speeches, letters, maps, petitions, and statements made during the interaction of the Indigenous Nations, in what would become Wisconsin, the Menominee and Hochunk and Indigenous Nations from New York State, Oneida, Stockbridge, and Brothertown who were being removed to this area in the 1820-1830's. In some cases, it was possible to hear the voices of our ancestors as they interacted during Nation to Nation treaty negotiations. Journals were kept by Indian Agents during treaty negotiations with the United States and provide invaluable insight.

The information found has not been previously published in an easily accessible format, and readers of my book have expressed their appreciation of the opportunity to broaden their knowledge and perspectives. The presentation will discuss the difficulties in the research process and the importance of documents found.

Most importantly, we recognized how listening to students and allowing them to choose what they want to read has created a sense of community and connection in our academic library. 2) how the dental health booklet was designed in consultation with community elders, a dental student, and local artists for cultural relevance, age-appropriateness, and ease of comprehension, and

3) how the resource was presented to and received by three parochial schools.

As a bonus, you will learn how to download, print, and share this free resource with your own communities!

Moon Memorial Library. While we have different roles in our respective organizations, we are all dedicated to making health and library resources accessible to everyone.

Empowering Wisconsin Libraries and Their Communities by Building Equity-Based Summers (BEBS)

Kelly Wochinske and Jeni Schomber participated in BEBS learning sessions this past summer. They will provide an outline of those learning sessions and share information on how your library can participate in a new initiative to help libraries design more equitable summer reading programs.

Recognizing the Squeeze: Strengthening Staff Through Supporting Middle Management

Speakers: Jennifer Chamberlain, Tasha Saecker, Nick Demske, Melissa Prentice, Michelle Tucker Since 2021, eleven mid-size Wisconsin public libraries have been working together as the City Library Collective to address common issues and share knowledge. Currently, the CLC is tackling a project broadly focused on strengthening library staff. As part of this endeavor, the Collective gathered data from staff focus groups and a survey. A critical takeaway is that middle management spends too much time assisting other staff with putting on their proverbial oxygen masks at work; the data suggests that while library leaders and supervisors are excelling in bolstering front-line staff, these efforts have left managers as a group in need of extra support. Come hear from several CLC members about their shared and localized approaches, ranging from practical work habits, to more robust staff development, to a CLC-wide project called "Staff Connections" designed to create supportive affinity groups. Participants will gain ideas they can incorporate into their organizational staffing models.

Space Matters: Renovating an Academic Library for Inclusion and Innovation

In 2024, Beloit College completed renovation of the Col. Robert H. Morse Library. The building was in dire need of renovation when the project started, however, more than the building's condition was a concern: accessibility issues started at the front door and library staff identified many other inclusion issues in the building originally built in 1961 and last renovated in 1991.

Beloit College partnered with the City of Beloit and received a grant to renovate the library to include an expanded community outreach and engagement center, unlocking new opportunities to innovate and showcase library services to campus and the local community. This presentation will review the designed inclusion of the renovated space, including a prayer/meditation/lactation room; challenges encountered during this unique project; and initial outcomes as library staff adapt and innovate in the new space.

Immersive Scientific Programming for Children, Using Virtual Reality and STEM Concepts

VR Expeditions in Your Library Fellowship, the Programming and Outreach Department at the Carnegie-Schadde Memorial Public Library created a large children's program for Baraboo's Winterfest. Intended for children 3-11, this program was an immersive experience, allowing children to explore Antarctica as novice scientists by using STEM concepts, active play, and playing Waddle: A Penguin's Tale, a VR experience created by Field Day Learning Games.

The presenter will convey how the programming staff developed appropriate scientific stations for children within the 3-11 age group, how they integrated virtual reality into the learning experience, and the creation of the "science journal" that allowed children to engage in the activities and learn how field scientists study Antarctica. This program will also highlight the challenges faced by a programming team new to using virtual reality and how they addressed these problems for future programs.

Fact-Checking for Students: Resist Misinformation and Find Reliable Sources Online

Evaluating the information they encounter online is an increasingly crucial skill for students. In this session, we will give examples of lessons educators can use to foster critical thinking skills and teach students how to be savvy consumers of online information. In this hands-on session, participants will try out factchecking strategies that they can later implement with their students. Participants will come away with concrete strategies for facilitating the analysis of online media and learn about PBS Wisconsin's free Media Literacy opportunities.

Overdue for Action - Naloxone and Harm Reduction Training for Wisconsin Libraries

Speakers: Jess Morrow, Jordan Ramsdell, Trevor Drulia More than 1 million people have died from an overdose in the past 20 years, and that number has been increasing each year. For Americans ages 18 - 45, the leading cause of death is now overdose. Innovative approaches are needed to protect our communities.

Harm reduction is a set of strategies used to protect the health and well-being of people who use drugs and their loved ones. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services' Harm Reduction Response Team (HRRT) seeks to expand harm reduction services to prevent overdose by offering: mobile syringe services, Naloxone distribution, drug checking, rapid testing for infectious diseases.

With 478 locations in Wisconsin, public libraries are a uniquely situated resource that play an integral role in community health and overdose protection. The HRRT will provide an overview of the services they provide, discuss harm reduction practices, and train attendees on how to reverse an overdose using Naloxone.

The Harm Reduction Response Team is a Wisconsin Department of Health Services initiative to provide harm reduction services to areas of concern based on data on overdose, population, and lack of current access to services. The program aims to expand non-judgmental health and social services to people who use drugs throughout Wisconsin to provide supportive resources, enhance their quality of life, and prevent overdoses. The team includes Program Coordinator Trevor Drulia and Outreach Specialists Jordan Ramsdell and Jess Morrow.
