## WLA CODE OF CONDUCT

The Wisconsin Library Association (WLA) holds professional conferences and meetings to enable its members to receive continuing education, build professional networks, and discover new products and services for professional use. To provide all participants - members and other attendees, speakers, exhibitors, staff, and volunteers - the opportunity to and have fun. Please do so responsibly and with respect for benefit from the event, WLA is committed to providing a harassment-free environment for everyone, regardless of gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, If you believe you have been harassed or that a harassment disability, physical appearance, ethnicity, religion or other group identity.

As an association, WLA is strongly committed to diversity, equity and the free expression of ideas. Taken cumulatively, these values are based on our professional organization's (Wisconsin Library Association) firm belief in the value of civil discourse and the free exploration of competing ideas and concepts - with a fundamental respect for the rights, dignity and value of all persons.

Within the context of this WLA Code of Conduct and, more broadly, the freedom of expression, critical examination of beliefs and viewpoints does not, by itself, constitute hostile conduct or harassment. Similarly, use of sexual imagery or language in the context of a professional discussion might not constitute hostile conduct or harassment.

WLA seeks to provide a conference environment in which diverse participants may learn, network and enjoy the company of colleagues in an environment of mutual human respect. We recognize a shared responsibility to create and hold that environment for the benefit of all. Some behaviors are, therefore, specifically prohibited:

- · Harassment or intimidation based on race, religion, language, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, disability, appearance, or other group status.
- Sexual harassment or intimidation, including unwelcome sexual attention, stalking (physical or virtual), or unsolicited physical contact.
- · Yelling at or threatening speakers or attendees (verbally or physically).
- Failure to comply with the Policies Governing Conference Registration, Conference Attendees, Speakers and Presenters, and Exhibitors.

Speakers are asked to frame discussions as openly and inclusively as possible and to be aware of how language or images may be perceived by others. Participants may at any time exercise the option of leaving a presentation or exhibit. Exhibitors must follow all WLA Exhibits rules, regulations, and policies as outlined in the Policies Governing Conference Registration, Conference Attendees, Speakers and Presenters; and Exhibitors as well as any event-specific requirements.

All participants are expected to observe these rules and behaviors in all conference venues, including online venues and conference social events. Participants asked to stop hostile or harassing behavior are expected to comply immediately. Conference participants seek to learn, network the right of others to do likewise.

problem exists, report the incident on WLA's website, using this link. After an online report is submitted, WLA will determine and carry out the appropriate course of action, and may engage WLA Directors, stad or legal counsel as appropriate. For more details about reporting, see WLA's Reporting Guide. Event security and/or local law enforcement may be involved, as appropriate based on the specific circumstances. A follow-up report will be made to individuals who report the harassment.

Special considerations for virtual events The provisions of the Wisconsin Library Association Code of Conduct apply to virtual WLA events. We remind virtual event attendees to remember that threats, harassment, and intimidation are just as damaging when transmitted online as they are in person and will be not be tolerated.

Attendees are prohibited from sharing content, recordings, chat logs, comments, or screenshots from WLA virtual events on any other online platforms or in any other virtual communications. Attendees should take only the notes they need for personal use. Recording of program sessions is prohibited, except for authorized agents of WLA capturing recordings for official WLA use. Disruption of presentations during sessions or other conference events is not acceptable. Any attendees who attempt to take over screensharing or broadcast unrelated images or messages during a conference event shall be removed from the meeting. People found in violation of any part of the WLA Code of Conduct will face consequences including but not limited to: expulsion from the conference, prohibition from returning to any future virtual event, and will not receive a refund of their registration fees.

# WLA POLICIES GOVERNING CONFERENCE REGISTRATION, CONFERENCE ATTENDEES, SPEAKERS AND PRESENTERS, AND EXHIBITORS REGISTRATION POLICIES

#### **Registration Policies**

- 1. All individuals in WLA conference spaces are required to have registration credentials (a registered attendee name badge). WLA staff (and in some cases venue staff) will monitor activities to ensure that all individuals in conference spaces are registered for the event/conference. These include but are not limited to keynote speaker addresses, breakout sessions, receptions, banquet functions, exhibit hall access, and tours. a. Spouses, partners, or other non-industry guests are required to register for every WLA conference function they choose to attend. These include but are not limited to keynote speaker addresses, breakout sessions, receptions, banquet functions, exhibit hall access, and tours.
- 2. Registration is required for all attendees at virtual events, even if attendees plan to participate in a group setting.
- 3. There will be a preferential registration fee for WLA members. A preferential registration fee may be extended to other groups with the approval of the WLA Board of Directors.
- 4. Unless otherwise indicated, volunteers are expected to pay the regular registration fees to attend the conference.
  5. Speakers are required to register for the conference if they plan to attend other conference events in addition to their individual session. Speakers do not need to register if they will only participate in/attend their individual session.
  6. Individuals registering for conferences and events must be current on payments for past events. WLA reserves the right to decline registration to individuals who have outstanding invoices for past events.
- 7. All conference attendees are required to review and sign the WLA Code of Conduct as part of the registration process.

#### **Speaker/Presenter Policies**

- The purpose of all keynote and breakout sessions at WLA Conferences is to provide educational content and focus.
   Honoraria for keynote speakers will be negotiated by WLA
- staff in consultation with the conference committee.
- 3. WLA does not provide compensation\* of any kind to breakout presenters. Breakout presenters that fall under this policy include, but are not limited to, employees and trustees of Wisconsin Libraries, library agencies or library systems; and those presenters not related to the Wisconsin library community. \*Special circumstances that are individually agreed upon may apply.
- 4. All conference speakers and presenters are required to review and sign the WLA Code of Conduct.

#### **Exhibit Hall Policies**

- 1. Exhibitors must register all representatives in attendance.
- 2. Selling or sales presentations are limited to the tradeshow floor and only by registered exhibitors. Any individual that is not a registered exhibitor is prohibited from soliciting WLA attendees in any space at the venue during the conference.
- 3. Exhibitors are required to staff their booth during posted exhibit hall hours. Tear-down before the posted tear-down period is not allowed unless approved by WLA in advance.
- 4. No unregistered individuals will be allowed on the tradeshow floor. This includes, but is not limited to, unregistered industry or non-industry individuals, vendors, visitors, and/or guests.

#### **Onsite Food & Beverage**

- 1. WLA staff will do their best to accommodate individuals with food allergens and other dietary restrictions. However, we cannot guarantee that event food offerings will meet every dietary request or requirement.
- 2. For food safety reasons and in compliance with venue policies and/or contractual catering agreements, attendees are not permitted to carry food out from WLA conference banquet buffets or any other functions.
- 3. Both alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages may be served at WLA socials, receptions, and other networking events. Participants at WLA events are expected to drink responsibly. WLA and venue staff have the right to deny service to attendees for any reason and may require an attendee to leave the event.

Individuals who violate any of the above policies may face expulsion from the conference function or the conference overall and will not be allowed to attend inperson WLA conferences for a period as determined by the Executive Committee of the WLA Board of Directors.





# **Keynote Speaker: Rachel Williams: Transforming Libraries Through Trauma Informed Practices**

Superior Room

Rachel Williams, Assistant Professor, School of Information Science University of South Carolina

Discover how trauma-informed librarianship can transform your library into a space of healing, support, and connection. Grounded in principles of safety, trust, and empowerment, trauma-informed librarianship reimagines the library as a space of care and connection. The session will define what it means to be trauma-informed, examine its implications for individual and organizational well-being, and offer evidence-based recommendations for fostering more responsive and resilient library environments.

Rachel D. Williams is an assistant professor in the School of Information Science at the University of South Carolina. Her research examines public library services for people in crisis. #### Navigating the World of Bilingual Children's Books

While this is well-intended and bilingual books can provide value to multilingual families and language learners, there are common issues that reduce their effectiveness and can contribute to the perception of English as dominant or superior. My presentation will summarize common challenges, using academic studies and community commentary, and provide suggestions for evaluating these books and improving multilingual collections. Key factors include supporting native-speaker and cultural insider voices, selecting books that treat languages equally, finding publishers dedicated to quality bilingual content, and reviewing community resources.

Past, Present, and Sovereign: Tribal Libraries in (What We Now Call) Wisconsin

This presentation will explore the rich history of tribal libraries across the region now known as Wisconsin. In addition to tracing their origins and evolution, the presentation will highlight the impact of recent federal funding cuts, showcase innovative and community-centered programming, and examine the use of culturally relevant classification systems. Attendees will gain a deeper understanding of how tribal libraries serve as powerful hubs of cultural preservation, education, and community.

Cassy Leeport began her role as the Director of the TLAM (Tribal Libraries, Archives, and Museums) Program at UW-Madison in July 2023. Cassy holds a BA in Creative Writing from UW-Madison, a Masters in Library & Information Science from UW-Madison, and a Masters in Curriculum and Instruction from Minnesota State University-Moorhead. Before returning to Wisconsin, Cassy served as the Director of Library Services and Tribal Archives for Red Lake Nation College, Circulation Manager for Bemidji State University's Library, and Library Services Program Specialist for Minnesota Department of Education. Cassy is also a proud direct-descendant of the Grand Portage Band of Lake Superior Ojibwe in Northern Minnesota, mother of two, and enthusiast for all things arts & crafts.

#### Be the Change for for Access to Justice in Your Community

Thanks to grant funding, LIFT Wisconsin is partnering with rural public libraries to host trainings and collaborate for resource sharing. This session aims to share information about being the change for access to justice for all members of the community. LIFT Wisconsin's offering for partnering is specifically aimed at rural communities in Wisconsin,

which makes up the majority of Wisconsin public libraries. Legal Tune Up is designed to help Wisconsinites identify and clear civil legal problems on their own or with help from trusted professionals. As a mobile first web-based application, it uses publicly available data (driver's license, criminal, eviction, court, and child support records) to help people identify and address legal needs. Low income individuals face the greatest challenges when it comes to accessing justice for civil legal barriers to their economic success which the Legal Tune Up tool seeks to address. In addition, the tool and the LIFT website are all available in Spanish.

Western Technical College is situated on Ho-Chunk land. Our aim was to honor Ho-Chunk language and history by providing opportunities for Ho-Chunk students and community

members as well as the Western community as a whole to hear and speak the original language of this land. With significant support from our Indigenous friends and colleagues, we launched "Ho-Chunk Storytime," events designed for students, staff, faculty, and community members. During these gatherings, participants enjoyed Ho-Chunk stories in their native language, learned about the culture, sampled Indigenous-inspired foods, and listened to members of the Ho-Chunk Nation share insights about their lived experiences.

We want to inspire others by demonstrating that it is indeed possible and necessary to cultivate multicultural spaces and reading communities, even with limited prior knowledge. It requires a willingness to learn, to make mistakes, and to embrace humility.

# Preparing for Intellectual Freedom Challenges: Essential Policies, Procedures, and Training for Library Readiness
