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

way through the COVID-19 Pandemic. Beyond the obvious health concerns, libraries have been forced to confront other questions ranging from access to information to remote work to budgetary questions. Sadly, many of these do not have answers yet and if they do, they are ones fraught with difficult decisions.

WLA has released two letters of support for libraries and librarians in recent weeks. First, WLA called for all public libraries to close as a precaution to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Second, the WLA Board approved a message to send to trustees and other library administrators advocating for continued payment of library staff who are working remotely or unable to work. It's my hope that this letter helps to keep library staff working, paid or otherwise employed until this is all over and we get back to our old "normal." This letter was not meant just for public libraries but ALL libraries – if you or your special library is closed, open, furloughed, or whatever and you seek guidance from WLA, please just let me know and I'll pass on what I can to you and get more information for you.

In other COVID-19 news, you probably saw that WLA had to cancel our three smaller in-person events: WAPL (public libraries), WAAL (academic libraries) and SSCS (support staff). These were all slated to take place in the next month or two and it was simply not feasible to have the conferences occur during the current health crisis. If you were registered to attend any of these, you will be getting a refund for your registration fees. WLA has two other in-person events that are currently in flux but are still slated to take place. First, the Leadership Development Institute that normally takes place in August is still on but decisions on that will be made in the coming weeks.

Second and probably most importantly to AWSL members is the status of the Annual Conference, which is currently scheduled for the end of October in Green Bay. As of now, this conference is scheduled to take place as usual. However, as with many things, there are many unknowns and things are changing rapidly. The Conference Leadership will be meeting with WLA Leadership in the coming weeks to determine what the plan is going forward. While October seems like a long ways away, there are already plans underway for the conference ranging from a Call for Proposals (send one in!) to committees seeking out local arrangements and sponsors. Additionally, the loss of the spring

conferences means that the Annual Conference may have to pick up sessions that would have been otherwise presented at these conferences. There are a lot of moving parts and even more questions that can't be answered yet! The bottom line for now is that the conference is still on but to watch for emails from the WLA Leadership about any changes to the conference plan.

Yet another aspect to the COVID-19 pandemic is financial. Associations large and small are facing challenges to their bottom line as they lose money-making conferences. This could be exacerbated in the library world where membership may be paid for by employers who no longer have the means to pay for professional memberships. Ironically, WLA's finances were looking healthier than they had in years before this pandemic occurred. Membership was up, investments were up and conference revenues were up. Now we are not sure what will happen. That is an all-too-common refrain in this article, but the biggest question mark is just how much WLA will suffer from losing conference revenue and if the membership income will be affected. Remember that WLA is here to support you and your library at the personal, professional, and legislative level. This was not a very bright and uplifting report this month, I know. But let's try and find some silver linings. I have heard that many libraries had a 'rush' to clear their shelves before they closed – it's hard to prove the value of a library better than that! And if nothing else, the amount of support that librarians have shown for each other in these unprecedented times has been amazing. It's great to be part of a community that has such close connections and works for the betterment of everyone. With that in mind, hang in there – we're all here for you. Always feel free to reach out to me with any questions you may have for the WLA Board. It can be related to special libraries or not – I want your voice heard and I am more than happy to bring your concerns to light. Please stay safe and stay healthy. We'll get through this together.
